## like - don' t like

These are used to demonstrate that you are fond of or not fond of something:
I like coffee, but I don'† like tea.
I like ice cream, but I don' $\dagger$ like milk.


## likes - doesn' † like

These are used to demonstrate that someone else is fond of or not fond of something:
Joe likes cats, but he doesn' $\dagger$ like dogs.
Eva doesn' $\dagger$ like dresses, but she likes trousers.
This is how you form the plural:

Careful:
If there is a consonant in front of the "y", the plural is formed by adding ies:
story stories

If a word ends in ,"ch, $x, s, s h "$, the plural is formed by adding es:
class
box
inch
toothbrush
classes
boxes
inches
singular + es
toothbrushes
like-likes - don't-doesn't
Toni likes bananas, but he doesn' $\dagger$ like oranges.
I $\qquad$ sweet_, but $\qquad$ like chocolate.
The monkey $\qquad$ ice cream and loll $\qquad$ .
Nora $\qquad$ reading, but she $\qquad$ like comic_.
I apple juice, but I $\qquad$ like orange juice.
The cat $\qquad$ like fish, but $\qquad$ bird $\qquad$ .
I $\qquad$ like school uniform_.
Toni $\qquad$ like coffee, but I $\qquad$ it.
